MICHAEL JUNG, PRESIDENT AND PUBLISHER

The Sunrise Rotary welcomed Michael Jung to the club. Mr. Jung recently accepted the position of President and Publisher of the News-Press.

The News-Press is a 131 year old publication, and now part of the Gannett Company.

From major changes in municipal leadership including the police department and the school board, to a run of crimes, to major weather events, Mr. Jung faced a tough 90 days on his arrival at the News-Press.

His goal is to be a catalyst for change. He invited residents to become involved by volunteering for a six-



month stint on the editorial board. He also invited residents to attend one of the 10:00 am news meetings which are open to the public.

The News-Press is aggressively pushing news through new technologies. Currently, over half of the News-Press audiences accesses content through digital applications.

Mr. Jung reminded us that News-Press subscribers are "Insiders", gaining access to unique content and community events sponsored by the News-Press.

Areas of focus in 2016 will include violence in the community, mental health issues, and of course, the 2016 elections.






MUSIC REVIEW

"The Sidewalks of New York" is a popular song about life in New York City during the 1890s. It was created by lyricist James W. Blake (23 September 1862 – 24 May 1935) and vaudeville actor and composer Charles B. Lawlor in 1894. The song proved successful afterwards, and is



often considered a theme for New York City. Many artists, including Mel Tormé, Duke Ellington, Larry Groce and The Grateful Dead, have performed this song. Governor Al Smith of New York used it as a theme song for his failed presidential campaign in 1928.[1] The song is also known under the title "East Side, West Side" from the first words of the chorus.

The tune, a slow and deliberate waltz, was devised by Lawlor, who had been humming the tune while stopping by the hat store where Blake worked. As the two became increasingly enthusiastic about the song, they agreed to collaborate, with Lawlor putting the tune to sheet music and Blake creating the lyrics. The words of the song tell the story of Blake's childhood, including the friends with whom he played as a child, namely Johnny Casey, Jimmy Crowe, Nellie Shannon (who danced the waltz), and Mamie O'Rourke (who taught Blake how to "trip the light fantastic" — an extravagant expression for dancing). The song is sung in nostalgic retrospect, as Blake and his childhood friends went their separate ways, some leading to success while others did not ("some are up in 'G' / others they are on the hog").

Governor Al Smith of New York is credited for the legacy of the song having used it as a theme for his 1928 presidential campaign. The urban-centric tune proved symbolic of a campaign that failed to find its footing in America's more rural areas, where Herbert Hoover was more popular. Although the song achieved cultural success shortly after its release, the two authors earned only \$5,000 for their efforts.[1] Lawlor died penniless in 1925, while Blake fell ill and died in 1935, their song reputedly having sold 5,000 copies a year by the time of Blake's passing.

ROTARY MINUTE

That same Route 41 runs from Miami, FL, through Fort



Myers, and on into Georgia, Tennessee, Kentucky, Indiana, Illinois, and further into Wisconsin and Michigan.

Eugene has been travelling to South Florida for many, many years, and bought a condo here in 1976. He considers South Florida his home away from home, and part of his family.

Eugene was a realtor and insurance broker by trade. He managed many of his father's properties. He also owned a liquor store on Sanibel, the Sanibel Sports Liquor Store.

Eugene attended the International Convention is San Paulo last year, and hosted an International Student last year. One of the many values he has seen in Rotary is his opportunity to meet people from all over the world.

ROTARY GIVES \$35 MILLION TO FIGHT POLIO

On January 13, 2016, Rotary International released \$35 million in grants to support polio immunization activities and research in nine countries, including Afghanistan and Pakistan.

The funds announced this week include \$11.4 million in Pakistan and \$6 million in Afghanistan, the two remaining polio-endemic countries. Funding will also support immunization activities in several countries still at-risk, including Nigeria (\$5.5m), Ethiopia (\$4.1m), Chad (\$2m), Somalia (\$1.8m), Cameroon (\$1.6m), Iraq (\$1.6 m), and India (\$618k). An additional \$355k will be allocated to polio research.

SHELTERBOX ON SHARK TANK

President Spanberger played a movie clip which featured the Rotary logo all over ShelterBoxes.

International disaster relief charity, ShelterBox, will be highlighted on the ABC hit show Shark Tank on January 8. Shark Tank



viewers will get an update on the LuminAID inflatable solar light invention which made its debut on the investment reality show last year. The segment will demonstrate how the solar lights are used on the front lines of disaster situations, with the founders traveling with ShelterBox to Malawi, where the 2015 flooding ravaged the country and displaced hundreds of thousands. Nearly one year later, survivors in Malawi are slowing rebuilding their lives with assistance from ShelterBox, which has provided hundreds of its aid boxes, each containing a disaster relief tent, blanket, ground sheets, tools kit, cooking set, water filtration unit, in addition to the LuminAID emergency solar lights which have been distributed to families that have lost everything from the flooding.

He looks forward to his position in Fort Myers because, Floridians still love






